May 9, 2019 – On behalf of the Nursing Community Coalition (NCC), a cross section of education, practice, research, and regulation within the nursing profession, we commend Senator Jeff Merkley (D-OR) and Senator Richard Burr (R-NC) for introducing the bipartisan bill, S. 1399, Title VIII Nursing Workforce Reauthorization Act of 2019.

During this National Nurses Week, and every day of the year, the Nursing Community Coalition is committed to improving the health and healthcare of our nation by supporting the education and practice of Registered Nurses (RNs) and Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs).
